The celebration of Christmas continues, for this solemnity is celebrated for eight days. The Christmas Season, then will last until the feast of the baptism of the Lord although some dioceses end the season end at Epiphany

After the Eternal Word of God; Jesus, took on our mortal flesh and entered into our time, the next mystery dawned unto us! God the Father, entrusted the care of His Son to a to a husband and wife; to Mary and Joseph; ordinary people; and the three became a Family

God by entrusting his Son to a family affirmed the importance of this unit in its functions and limitations! This is the unit built in love and for love; It enables love to be transmitted, experienced and shared! It's a unit governed by principles, at different times; many times, called to, selfless-giving and sacrificial generosity.

The first and second readings of today, presents us with such challenges; *“Wives, be subject to your husbands as is fitting in the Lord. Husbands, love your wives and do not be harsh with them. Children obey your parents ... for this is what pleases the Lord.*

“Fathers, do not provoke your children lest they become discouraged.”

“Whoever respects their mother is like one who lays up treasure. The Person who honors their father will have joy in their children.”

Pope Leo XIV, in his message on Holy Family urged us to imitate the Holy Family of Nazareth as a model; *“The Perfect model for all families; the model that forge love, and model of holiness, where God dwells, offering lessons in faith and mutual support and beacon of hope.”*

Pope Paul VI in 1964, reflecting in today's Gospel and the troubles with King Herod; would write; *“The family is beautiful for the problems it poses and the rewards it brings! In sum, it is the perfect setting for rearing a child.”*

Imagine the problem in the Gospel of today; It would be a nightmare for any parent; Joseph and Mary with a young infant are commandment to take a very lengthy journey to Egypt to save the child for the wrath of Herod; *“Joseph, get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.”*

We witness the greatness of Joseph, again; He is silent! We read; *“Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt and remained there until the death of Herod.”*

Then we read *“This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord though the Prophet, Out of Egypt I have called my Son.”*

Joseph and Mary are at the core of God's plan to save humanity, and none of them question; they heed the Will of the Lord in sincere and absolute obedience.

May the Lord grant us the grace to emulate them.

II. THE MYSTERIES OF JESUS' INFANCY AND HIDDEN LIFE

The mysteries of Jesus 'hidden life

531 During the greater part of his life Jesus shared the condition of the vast majority of human beings: a daily life spent without evident greatness, a life of manual labour. His religious life was that of a Jew obedient to the law of God,²²¹ a life in the community. From this whole period it is revealed to us that Jesus was "obedient" to his parents and that he "increased in wisdom and in stature, and in favour with God and man."²²²

532. Jesus' obedience to his mother and legal father fulfils the fourth commandment perfectly and was the temporal image of his filial obedience to his Father in heaven. the everyday obedience of Jesus to Joseph and Mary both announced and anticipated the obedience of Holy Thursday: "Not my will. . ."²²³ The obedience of Christ in the daily routine of his hidden life was already inaugurating his work of restoring what the disobedience of Adam had destroyed.²²⁴

533. The hidden life at Nazareth allows everyone to enter into fellowship with Jesus by the most ordinary events of daily life:

The home of Nazareth is the school where we begin to understand the life of Jesus - the school of the Gospel. First, then, a lesson of silence. May esteem for silence, that admirable and indispensable condition of mind, revive in us. . . A lesson on family life. May Nazareth teach us what family life is, its communion of love, its austere and simple beauty, and its sacred and inviolable character... A lesson of work. Nazareth, home of the "Carpenter's Son", in you I would choose to understand and proclaim the severe and redeeming law of human work. . . To conclude, I want to greet all the workers of the world, holding up to them their great pattern their brother who is God.²²⁵

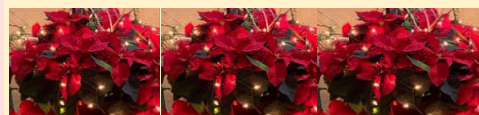

Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph *Dec 28th*

Devotion to the Holy Family flourished in the Renaissance. The leading artists of the time – Michaelangelo, Raphael, El Greco, Rembrandt, Rubens, to name a few – often portrayed the Holy Family in their work. When this feast day was instituted in 1921, it was originally assigned to the third Sunday after Christmas. It is now observed on the first Sunday following Christmas (unless Christmas itself falls on a Sunday, in which case Holy Family is celebrated on Friday, December 30).

What is the role of parents in nurturing the faith to their children?

Answer: Parents hold a central role in Catholic teaching as the primary educators of their children. This duty goes beyond academic learning to include moral and spiritual formation. The Church expects parents to teach their children about God, prayer, and the sacraments. They must model virtues like charity, patience, and honesty in daily life. By doing so, they prepare their children for a life of faith. Parents are also responsible for ensuring their children receive the sacraments, such as Baptism and Confirmation. This role is not optional but a serious obligation in Catholic belief. The Church supports this in CCC 2221-2231, stressing the importance of parental guidance. Failure to fulfill this duty can weaken the family's spiritual life. Ultimately, parents shape the next generation of the Church.

Nurturing faith within the family is a shared task, led by parents but involving all members. Daily prayer, such as the Rosary or grace before meals, builds a habit of turning to God. Attending Mass together as a family reinforces this commitment. Parents must also explain Catholic teachings in ways children can understand. This might include discussing the meaning of Sunday readings or holy days. The Church sees this as vital for passing down the faith. Children grow in faith by seeing it lived out at home. The Catechism highlights this in CCC 1656-1657, linking family prayer to spiritual strength. Neglecting this responsibility risks distancing the family from God. A faith-filled home, then, becomes a source of grace.
