

Conversion of St. Paul [January 25th](#)

"I can do everything through him who gives me strength."



The Lord is my Light and my Salvation, whom shall I fear?" Psalm 27.1

The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? We sang in the Responsorial Psalm of today.

One thing I ask of the Lord, one thing I seek after: to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord... I believe that I shall see the goodness of the Lord, in the Land of the Living ... Wait for the Lord ... Be Strong!

Psalm 27 is a beautiful prayer, an ultimate declaration of faith in the greatness of God and a trust in his boundless protection. The Psalm, as for many other Psalms, are traditionally attributed to King David. He, though known to have been a very strong and effective warrior, never relied on himself. He had learnt in his youth, as a shepherd, that his strength and success came from God. Yes, David, had attributes that would make any leader great; a sincere fear of the Lord and absolute faith in God, for his salvation."

Prophet Isaiah, in the 1st Reading today addresses his people who unlike King David, relied on the power of man. They sought help from the Syrians, against the advice of the Prophet who was pleading with them to trust in God's protection. The result was destruction and ruin. The Assyrian made them a vassal state and settled among them, bringing with them their Idol gods. Paganism took root and the remnants of the chosen people, thinly scattered in the region, found it difficult to retain their faith in the One True God.

Isaiah points to this, as great darkness; the return to idolatry and vanishing of the knowledge of the One True God; He used the word "gloom," to describe the void; that emptiness in a heart of one who turns away from God.

Isaiah, foresaw a time, when this darkness would be turned into brightness; brilliant as the noon-day. We read; *"For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, will be broken!*

This Prophecy of Isaiah is proclaimed by Mathew the Evangelist, as having been fulfilled in Christ Jesus in today's Gospel Reading! As we read: *He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum, by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the Prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles- the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light."*

Jesus, in the Gospel, begins his public ministry, having been silent in Nazareth for 30 years. John the Baptist exits the scene; his role having been fulfilled, and is arrested.

Jesus begins the Mission of his Father with the Words ***"Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand."*** Repent; make a U-turn, back toward the Living God, aware of the Privilege allotted one in his Son's coming. ***"The Kingdom of Heaven is at hand!"*** God is acting directly among his people! This is the moment when God's Presence is real and touchable as in the Garden of Eden.

God's Eternal Plan for us in Christ Jesus, is that, we be with Him and experience Eternal Joy in his Presence forever. Blessed are you because you believe.

Conversion of St. Paul *Jan 25th*

The conversion of Paul was a turning point in the history of the early Church. Saul, as Paul was first known, was a tentmaker from Tarsus who zealously persecuted the followers of Christ. While travelling on the road to Damascus, he was struck down amidst a blinding light from heaven. According to the accounts in Acts of the Apostles (9:1-22; 22:3-16; 26:12-18) a voice asked, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" Following the instructions he was given, Saul headed into Damascus and began proclaiming Jesus. Threatened with death for his actions, Paul escaped the city by being lowered in a basket over the city wall. Paul's zeal for the risen Jesus led him to become a passionate follower and later a teacher of the nations. The letters, or epistles, of Paul offer us a window into the early church. *Living with Christ January 2026 edition*

What is Apostolic Succession?

Apostolic succession is the doctrine that the bishops of the Catholic Church have received their spiritual authority directly from the apostles, through an unbroken chain of valid ordinations, guaranteed by the laying on of hands and the invocation of the Holy Spirit. (CCC 861)

Biblical Foundation: Not a human invention

Apostolic succession is not a medieval invention. It has direct roots in Scripture:

a. The election of Matthias (Acts 1:15–26)

When Judas betrays Jesus and loses his place among the Twelve, Peter proposes that someone else should be chosen to “take the place in this ministry and apostleship”

(Acts 1:25). Matthias is elected and “added to the eleven apostles” (Acts 1:26). This shows that the apostolic ministry is transmissible.

b. Saint Paul and Timothy

Paul writes to his disciple:

“For this reason, I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands.” (2 Tim 1:6)

This passage clearly states that the gifts of apostolic ministry are transmitted **by the laying on of hands**, i.e., through valid ordination.

History: A golden thread through the centuries

a. The Church Fathers Saint Irenaeus of Lyon, as early as the second century, affirms in his work *Against Heresies*:

“We can enumerate those who were appointed bishops by the apostles, and their successors down to our own time. This is the surest proof of truth.”

The early Church understood clearly that the validity of teaching and sacraments depended on this apostolic continuity.

b. The lineage of Peter

The Church of Rome, for instance, can trace an unbroken line of bishops from Saint Peter to the current Pope. This is a sign of unity, fidelity, and authenticity. Current Pope of the Catholic Church

The Pope is the successor of St. Peter the Apostle. He is also, the Bishop of Rome and the spiritual leader of the worldwide Catholic Church, currently held by Pope Leo XIV elected on My 8, 2025.

He is formerly Cardinal Robert Prevost. He succeeded Pope Francis, who served from March 13, 2023, until April 21, 2025. Pope Leo XIV's election marks a continuation of the papal lineage, which has played a significant role in the history of Christianity and the Catholic Church. He resides in Vatican City, an independent city-state established by the Lateran Treaty in 1929, which ensures the political and spiritual independence of the Holy See.

Responsibilities

The Pope's responsibilities include leading the Catholic Church, making decisions on faith and morality, engaging in ecumenical dialogue, and addressing contemporary issues such as human rights and social justice. The Pope also plays a crucial role in the Church's central government, guiding the administration of the Holy See and its various departments.

In summary, the Pope is a pivotal figure in the Catholic Church, embodying spiritual leadership and continuity of the apostolic mission established by Jesus Christ.
