St. Gregory of Narek Feb 27th
Pray for us.

"In the face of my darkness, you are light. In the face of my mortality, you are life."

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"Father, forgive them; they do not know what they are doing." Luke 23:34

I say to you that listen; "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you, to him who strikes you on the right cheek offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your ... Do to others as you would have them do to you." Notice it's to you that listen!

The Gospel today, gives us, the disciples' response to God's generous self-giving love; a response to the blessedness of being in his Presence, in the person of Christ Jesus. This response is to, the beautiful experience, of our ongoing encounter with Emanuel; God with us.

Last Sunday in the Beatitudes, Jesus revealed and proclaimed the new way of the Kingdom of God. This was the way of the Son of God; who emptied himself, off his glory and became one with us, and taking our nature, he was humbler yet, even accepting death, death on a cross, for our salvation. (Phil 2:6-9)

In a World where "an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, a life for a life" are a common practice, it's only a true disciple who can reciprocate the self-giving love lived by Christ Jesus without reservation.

Jesus, through his life and death taught us that, love of an enemy is possible; "Father, forgive them; they do not know what they are doing." (Lk. 23:34)

The 1st reading of today, gives us, the figure of David and his friend Abishai, who together with their companions were freeing King Saul and his massive army. Ever since, David was anointed king, by Samuel, and was taken to the King Saul's presence, at the king's own request, David had done only good for King and his people.

King Saul, on the other hand, out of jealousy wanted David dead and driven by anger and hatred, had been pursuing David and his people for days to kill them. King Saul had chosen to be a true and dangerous enemy to David.

David had a chance to kill Saul several times, and in today's reading, David and Abishai snuck at night into King Saul's tent while all his soldiers and body guards were sleeping. David had a chance! Abishai insisted with him, to strike his enemy; "God has given your enemy into your hands, Abishai said, now let me pin him to the ground with one stroke of the spear." (1Sam 26:8)

David refused to strike the Lord anointed, instead, spared his life, to the surprise of Abishai, his friend. David, however, took the King's spear and reaching a distance away called on Saul to get his Spear.

King Saul aware that David could have taken revenge but didn't, and instead spared his life, relented, for some time from pursuing David. David had resolved evil with good.

Brothers and Sister, blessed, in Christ Jesus through his "life-giving spirit," we are called to imitate this second Adam. And here is the promise given in the concluding verse of the 2nd Reading of today; "Just as we have borne the Image of the one of dust, we will also bear the Image of the One in Heaven." (1Cor. 15:45)

May the Lord increase our Love for one another. Amen.

St. Gregory of Narek Feb 27th

St. Gregory of Narek was a 10th-century Armenian monk, poet, and mystical writer and composer. His best-known literary work is a book of prayers, *The Book of Lamentations*. It is considered a masterpiece of Armenian literature. St. Gregory himself defined the work as an "encyclopedia of prayer for all nations." And hoped that it would provide guidance in prayer for people of all walks of life.

In 2021, Pope Francis inscribed St. Gregory of Narek, Abbot and Doctor of the Church, on February 27 as an Optional Memorial in the Roman Calendar. St. Gregory of Narek is recognized as a saint in both the Catholic Church and in the Armenian Apostolic Church, being venerated in a particular way among Catholics of the Armenian Rite.

 with their own scheduled liturgies and events, as well as a regular
 schedule of the times when the church is open or closed for visits.
- A pilgrimage group wishing to celebrate Mass and/or offer Confessions will be asked to bring their own priest to celebrate, and at a time agreed to by the pastor.

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Letter of Cardinal Leo to the Minister of Health



Hon. Mark Holland Minister of Health Government of Canada Sent via e-mail

February 14, 2025

Dear Minister Holland.

Be assured of my ongoing prayers for you and all those who are entrusted to serve and strengthen our country.

I reach out today regarding the current consultation taking place regarding advance directives as it relates to euthanasia in Canada (referred to in legal terms as Medical Assistance in Dying – MAID). While the consultation period is about to close, I feel that it is important for you to hear feedback regarding the process and language conveyed in the consultation.

I understand the Government of Canada wishes to solicit views from Canadians on proposals relating to end of life care. However, I must convey both, in my own opinion and from those deeply engaged in end of life issues, that the wording and overall approach of the survey pre-supposes that those responding support euthanasia. We know this is simply not true.

Over the past decade, there has been significant opposition to the legalization of "Medical Assistance in Dying" in Canada. While legislation has been passed, there remains deep concern from many Canadians about the rapid expansion of euthanasia, especially from those living with disabilities, medical professionals and those with deeply rooted beliefs regarding the sanctity of life at every stage to name just a few.

According to Health Canada <u>data</u>, in total, 15,343 Canadians died from euthanasia in 2023. This represents a 15.8% increase over 2022 with more than 1 in every 20 deaths attributed to assisted death in 2023.

The movement towards including advanced directives as another pathway to euthanasia is disturbing. We are encouraging those who have not yet been diagnosed to "schedule" their death based on the fear of what may come. Others may be pressured, even by those in the medical profession, seeing themselves as a burden to their family or caregivers.

Your government is normalizing euthanasia – by extension, those experiencing loneliness, isolation and depression associated with their medical condition are increasingly vulnerable to choosing euthanasia. This is not something our country should be proud of. We should be judged by the care, love and dignity afforded to those who are most vulnerable, especially in moments of despair and suffering. Hastening death is not a breakthrough in healthcare.

I would respectfully request that the government give serious consideration to halting any further expansion of euthanasia in Canada, especially as it relates to advance directives. Future consultation should also take into account all views on end of life care.

I would also ask, as others have for years, that the federal government prioritize palliative care over euthanasia, recognizing the need for quality palliative care to be accessible and available to every Canadian. <u>Horizons of Hope</u>, an initiative of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops and numerous faith-based partners, is one such example of how we can both educate our community and encourage outreach to the sick and suffering by offering quality palliative care.

I would be happy to meet along with those with expertise in palliative care should you ever wish to discuss this matter in greater detail.

I will continue to keep you and all Members of Parliament close in prayer.
