

"That day, sing of the beautiful vineyard, I Yahweh, am its guardian, from time to time, I water it; so that no harm befall it,

I guard it night and day." Isaiah 27:2-3

"I am the Vine, you are the branches, whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing!"

The symbol of vine and the vineyard were well known to the people of Israel at the time of Christ. The image of vine was used by the prophets to console and uplift; to warn and remind the people of Israel of the importance of their relationship with God.

In Isaiah 27: 2-3 we read "That day, sing of the beautiful vineyard, I Yahweh, am its guardian, from time to time, I water it; so that no harm befall it, I guard it night and day." In Jeremiah 2:21 we read: "Yet I had planted you, a red vine, of completely sound stock. How is it that you have turned into seedlings of the vine alien to me?"

Israel was the beloved of God but more often than not, she was unfaithful to the Covenant!

In the Gospel today, Jesus, emphasis his faithfulness as the true vine. He proclaimed himself this vine and his disciples as its branches. Here, Jesus symbolizes the unity, the oneness with his disciples mirroring that of himself with God, His Father.

As in the vine, the same sap flows from the roots, through the stem to the branches, in the disciple's relationship with Christ, the same life-giving Spirit flows in the disciple as in Christ! A few verses beyond what we read today; Jesus tells us the reason as to why he is revealing this to his Disciples; "I have loved you just as the Father has loved me. Remain in my Love. ... I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy may be complete."

God the Father is the unique source of life and being the vinedresser, He cares for the well-being of the branches. He is the source all life because of his love for every creature. And in as much as God Loves, He draws us, the disciples, into this divine oneness shared with the Son. You can understand then, why away from him we cannot survive.

The positive response of a disciple, accepting discipleship, is a fruitful response. A disciple immersed into the divine union, a union that generates, cannot fail to produce.

"Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you, unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing."

God our Father is glorified when through us, many come to know him: accept and experience the immensity his Love.

"By this is my Father glorified, that you bear much fruit."

CHAPTER ONE
The Dignity of the Human Person

OUR VOCATION TO BEATITUDE

362. What is eternal happiness? 1720-1724; 1727-1729

It is the vision of God in eternal life in which we are fully "partakers of the divine nature" (2 Peter 1:4), of the glory of Christ and of the joy of the trinitarian life. This happiness surpasses human capabilities. It is a supernatural and gratuitous gift of God just as is the grace which leads to it. This promised happiness confronts us with decisive moral choices concerning earthly goods and urges us to love God above all things.

MAN'S FREEDOM

363. What is freedom? 1730-1733, 1743-1744

Freedom is the power given by God to act or not to act, to do this or to do that, and so to perform deliberate actions on one's own responsibility. Freedom characterizes properly human acts. The more one does what is good, the freer one becomes. Freedom attains its proper perfection when it is directed toward God, the highest good and our beatitude. Freedom implies also the possibility of choosing between good and evil. The choice of evil is an abuse of freedom and leads to the slavery of sin.

364. What is the relationship between freedom and responsibility? 1734-1737; 1745-1746

Freedom makes people responsible for their actions to the extent that they are voluntary, even if the imputability and responsibility for an action can be diminished or sometimes cancelled by ignorance, inadvertence, duress, fear, inordinate attachments, or habit.

365. Why does everyone have a right to exercise freedom? 1738-1747

The right to the exercise of freedom belongs to everyone because it is inseparable from his or her dignity as a human person. Therefore, this right must always be respected, especially in moral and religious matters, and it must be recognized and protected by civil authority within the limits of the common good and a just public order.

Our Patron Saint...

St. Catherine of Siena

One of four women honoured with the title of Doctor of the Church, Catherine was born in Siena Italy, in 1347, her parents' 25th and youngest child. At the age of seven, following a vision of Christ in glory, she is reported to have vowed her virginity to God. She joined the Dominican Third in 1365, spending years in seclusion from the world, fasting and praying. In 1368, after a vision where Christ accepted her as his "bride," she felt called to carry this love to others. She cared for the poor and tended the sick; she corresponded with people from all walks of life, even counselling princes and popes; she was renowned as a peacemaker. She is especially remembered for her spiritual reflections.

She died in Rome in 1380. This great Christian mystic was canonized in 1461, became a patron of Italy in 1939, and was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1970. With St. Briget of Sweden and St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, she is co-patron of Europe. Living with Christ, April 2024 edition
