# "I know you just too well, 'you do not have the Love of God in you." John 6:52

"Thus, you will give witness of your wisdom and intelligence to other Peoples, ... When the other Nations see and witness your adherence to the will of God they will say; "This Great Nation is Truly a Wise and Intelligent People."

This is the purpose of God's Commandments! Keeping of God's commandments is a privilege that illumine the people, making them witnesses who reflect God, the Lawgiver.

In the Gospel reading, this Sunday, Jesus, God among his People is the Law Giver. He is in conflict with the Scribes and Pharisees, who claimed themselves to be right with God and boasted of keeping all the Commandments of God faithfully!

Jesus condemns them as Hypocrites! The question then becomes; Why?

Jesus did not condemn them because they kept the Law, but because their keeping of the Law, had become an end in itself. They had forgotten the Spirit of the Law, The Spirit that illumined them to direct others to its Source; God, the Father and Creator!

Jesus condemns them, sternly, in John 5:42, with the words; "I know you just too well, 'you do not have the Love of God in you."

Jesus challenged them to the dictates of their hearts, reminding them of the New Covenant foreseen by Prophet Jeremiah 31:33; Covenant, written on peoples' hearts. Jesus challenged them to "an introspection;" "an examination of Conscience."

He called on them to reflect on the obvious; It is from within the Heart of a Person, where evil originates and Jesus enumerated a number of these evils; "fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride and folly."

Conversely, it's in the Heart of "One who loves God," where, compassion and forgiveness, generosity and humility, justice and peace, trust, hope and above all Love of God originate.

Jesus called his disciples and us to the dictate of our hearts!

#### CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

Section One - Prayer in the Christian Life

**535.** Why is there a universal call to prayer? 2566-2567 Because through creation God first calls every being from nothingness. Even after the Fall man continues to be capable of recognizing his Creator and retains a desire for the One who has called him into existence. All religions, and the whole history of salvation in particular, bear witness to this human desire for God. It is God first of all, however, who ceaselessly draws every person to the mysterious encounter known as prayer.

**536.** How is Abraham a model of prayer? 2570-2573, 2592 Abraham is a model of prayer because he walked in the presence of God, heard and obeyed him. His prayer was a battle of faith because he continued to believe in the fidelity of God even in times of trial. Besides, after having received in his own tent the visit of the Lord who confided his plan to him, Abraham dared to intercede for sinners with bold confidence.

**537. How did Moses pray? 2574-2577, 2593-** The prayer of Moses was typical of contemplative prayer. God, who called to Moses from the burning bush, lingered in conversation with him often and at length, "face to face, like a man with his friend" (Exodus 33:11). In this intimacy with God, Moses attained the strength to intercede tenaciously for his people: his prayer thus prefigured the intercession of the one mediator, Christ Jesus.

**538.** In the Old Testament, what relationship do the king and the temple have to prayer? 2578-2580, 2594- The prayer of the People of God developed in the shadow of the dwelling place of God – the Ark of the Covenant, then the Temple – under the guidance of their shepherds. Among them there was David, the King "after God's own heart," the shepherd who prayed for his people. His prayer was a model for the prayer of the people because it involved clinging to the divine promise and a trust filled with love for the One who is the only King and Lord.

**539.** What is the role of prayer in the mission of the prophets? **2581-2584** The prophets drew from prayer the light and strength to exhort the people to faith and to conversion of heart. They entered into great intimacy with God and interceded for their brothers and sisters to whom they proclaimed what they had seen and heard from the Lord. Elijah was the father of the prophets, of those who sought the face of God. On Mount Carmel he achieved the return of the people to the faith, thanks to the intervention of God to whom he prayed: "Answer me, O Lord, answer me!" (1 Kings 18:37).

#### St. Gregory the Great Sep 3rd

Saint Gregory was born about the year 540 into a wealthy Roman family. After brief but distinguished service as Chief Magistrate of Rome, Gregory resigned to become a Benedictive monk and used his great wealth to establish several monasteries. In 578 he was ordained deacon and sent to Constantinople as papal ambassador.

In 586 Gregory was recalled to Rome and became abbot. Four years later he was elected pope. His charity in feeding starving Romans, his protection of Jewish rights and his political diplomacy helped him earn the title 'Great'. Several centuries after his death, Gregory was credited with developing Gregorian chant, although this remains disputed.

He is known as the Apostle of England for sending missionaries there, including Augustine of Canterbury. Gregory, who died in 604, is a Doctor of the Church. Living with Christ, Sep 2024 edition



Give me a generous spirit to be enthusiastic with my studies and courage to accept new opportunities.


