Jesus asked them; "What were you arguing about on the way?" "But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest."

In this beautiful World we live in, honor and greatness are valued if not worshipped! And competition seems to govern many aspects of our lives; people thrill and value the experience of winning. So, when we hear Jesus say "whoever wants to be first must be the last of all and the servant of all," this can be concerning if not shocking!

In the Gospel reading, today, Jesus was on the journey to Jerusalem where he was to fulfill the Will of the Father for our salvation. His disciples, in the profession of Peter in last Sunday's Gospel, knew who Jesus was; "The Christ," "The Anointed of God."

It was the expectation of the day that the long awaited Messiah, would rebuild Israel anew, restoring her to the glory of the days of David the King, with an abundance of freedom, prosperity, peace and security prevailed. No wonder then, that the disciples were positioning themselves for greatness in the forthcoming earthly dominion of Christ; the King!

You can imagine then how shocked they were when they heard their Master, revealed to them of his imminent betrayal and death! This must have been absolutely unthinkable and unacceptable for One who through many miracles had clearly revealed that He had power over all! In the Gospel, last Sunday, Peter had even taken Jesus aside and tempted to derail him from the Will of the Father.

In the Gospel today, Jesus takes his disciples aside by themselves so that they could have a moment together; where the disciples could be attentive! In Capernaum, in the privacy of the house, Jesus begun his teaching by asking his disciples, what they were arguing about on the way! Scripture says; The Disciples were reduced to silence! It also tells us why they were silent; they were arguing about who among them was the greatest.

Jesus took a child and put him among the disciples. The child became the focus of attention as the disciples stopped looking at themselves.

The child, the symbol of innocence and simplicity, the symbol of dependence and trust! The child a symbol of humility and receptivity; Here became the symbol of Wisdom" in the Kingdom of God. "Whoever receives one child such as this in my name receives me, and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me."

In the Kingdom of God, acceptance and service of the insignificant is the Way to greatness! And receiving and serving the insignificant is the Way to God.

As the disciples listened in a simplicity that they themselves found impossible to accept; <u>the</u> teaching they were hearing was generously being fulfilled in their very midst:

The Son of God had taken up our human nature, and was present among us and was on his way to Jerusalem in obedience to the Father where his ultimate self-giving act for the love of humanity would take place! He alone who had power over all had deliberately given it up!

COMPENDIUM OF THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH PRAYER IS FULLY REVEALED AND REALIZED IN JESUS

- **541. From whom did Jesus learn how to pray?**2599-2620 Jesus, with his human heart, learned how to pray from his mother and from the Jewish tradition. But his prayer sprang from a more secret source because he is the eternal Son of God who in his holy humanity offers his perfect filial prayer to his Father.
- **542.** When did Jesus pray? 2600-2604, 2620 The Gospel often shows Jesus at prayer. We see him draw apart to pray in solitude, even at night. He prays before the decisive moments of his mission or that of his apostles. In fact, all his life is a prayer because he is in a constant communion of love with the Father.
- **543.** How did Jesus pray during his passion? 2605-2606, 2620 The prayer of Jesus during his agony in the garden of Gethsemani and his last words on the cross reveal the depth of his filial prayer. Jesus brings to completion the loving plan of the Father and takes upon himself all the anguish of humanity and all the petitions and intercessions of the history of salvation. He presents them to the Father who accepts them and answers them beyond all hope by raising his Son from the dead.
- **544.** How does Jesus teach us to pray?2608-2614, 2621 Jesus teaches us to pray not only with the Our Father but also when he prays. In this way he teaches us, in addition to the content, the dispositions necessary for every true prayer: purity of heart that seeks the Kingdom and forgives one's enemies, bold and filial faith that goes beyond what we feel and understand, and watchfulness that protects the disciple from temptation.
- **545.** Why is our prayer efficacious? 2615-2616 Our prayer is efficacious because it is united in faith with the prayer of Jesus. In him Christian prayer becomes a communion of love with the Father. In this way we can present our petitions to God and be heard: "Ask and you will receive that your joy may be full" (John 16:24).
- **546.** How did the Virgin Mary pray? 2617-2618 2622, 2674, 2679 Mary's prayer was characterized by faith and by the generous offering of her whole being to God. The Mother of Jesus is also the new Eve, the "Mother of all the living". She prays to Jesus for the needs of all people.
- **547.** Is there a prayer of Mary in the Gospel?2619 Along with the prayer of Mary at Cana in Galilee, the Gospel gives us the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55) which is the song both of the Mother of God and of the Church, the joyous thanksgiving that rises from the hearts of the poor because their hope is met by the fulfillment of the divine promises.

St. Pius Pietrelcina sep 23rd

Francesco Forgione (1887-1968) was born in the Italian village of Pietrelcina. He entered the novitiate of the Capuchin Friars at the age of 16 taking the name Pio ('pious'), and was ordained in 1910. A stigmatic, he lived more than 50 years at the friary of San Giovanni Rotondo, devoted to a life of ministry through sacramental reconciliation and celebration of the Eucharist, and helping countless people who sought his counsel.

Pope Paul VI said of him: "Look what fame he had, what a worldwide following gathered around him! Bu why? Perhaps because he was a philosopher? Because he was wise? Because he had resources at this disposal? Because he said Mass humbly, heard confessions from dawn to dusk and was — it is not easy to say it- one who bore the wounds of our Lord. He was a man of prayer and suffering." Padre Pio was canonized by Pope John Paul II in 2002.

Homily of His Grace Most Reverend Francis Leo Metropolitan Archbishop of Toronto Stewardship Sunday – 22 September 2024

Praised be Jesus Christ.

Brothers and Sisters in the Lord,


Today, we celebrate Stewardship Sunday across the Archdiocese of Toronto. I welcome this opportunity to speak with you briefly about a very important aspect of our lives as Christians, about how we express our faith both individually and as a Church and how we live our convictions and serve in a world that does not always understand what it means to be loved by God and to be actively pursuing his purpose in our lives, fulfilling his saving plan. What I am speaking about is Stewardship and I wish to underscore especially how it constitutes the path to authentic Christian living and holiness.

We gather as a community of believers and worshipers, disciples and witnesses of the Risen Christ. We desire to be in right relationship with the Lord, a relationship which is deep and personal, transformative and redemptive. It is a life of faith and trust which colours our daily living. We want to get to know him better, to serve his Kingdom faithfully and to be with him forever when the time comes to leave this earthly dwelling. As pilgrims on a journey, we interact with a myriad of persons and are invited to love and serve with the very love of Christ and to love out of love for Christ — even our enemies. This requires that we make efforts to grow in His love, to grow in virtue, to grow in service. Stewardship is about this growth... in love, virtue and service. It is about fostering an engaging awareness of God who calls us to live, to abide in His presence daily, to witness and to show his face to our wounded humanity.

Stewardship is the crucial process, the inner attitude and multi-faceted approach that leads us to a place of humble recognition of who we are, of who God is and what the Lord desires to accomplish in, through and around us. Perhaps you have never heard stewardship described as a process or a way of living our Catholic faith. In the past we have heard about stewardship almost exclusively with respect to sharing gifts, using our talents and resources in service of God and the community; the main focus was about caring for what is entrusted to us and sharing it with others—making the world a better place. All very true, and essential — but it is not the entire story. When speaking of stewardship more along the lines of a life-giving development of faith and engagement, a dynamic transformation, a way of being Catholic and serving as a follower of the Incarnate God, a living and active commitment that changes life and changes lives, then it is not a one-time act of giving or sacrifice, or even awareness. It is a fundamental, vivifying, compelling disposition of the heart, the mind and the will that strives to uncover, discover and re-discover the riches and mystery of God and serve his greater purpose for our lives. Clarifying the distorted understanding of what true greatness is, Jesus reminds his disciples in today's Gospel reading: "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all". This is the royal way, the way of the King, the road to the Kingdom and it is the life of every authentic believer.
