

Today we celebrate the 32nd Sunday of the Liturgical Year. We are nearing Christ the King and there after Advent and we continue to hear from Jesus as He made his final journey to Jerusalem and the Cross; Today he has arrived and he is at the Temple Area.

The Theme these past Sundays we have been focusing on the way to greatness in the Kingdom of God! It all begun with the question that was posed to Christ on the 28th Sunday; "Good Master what must I do to inherit eternal Life?"

Jesus dealt with the commandments as the Way and the Lawyer had done well. Jesus looked at him and loved him. He then challenged him; *"There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own ... and Come and Follow me.*" At these words his face fell and he went away sad."

Jesus then taught us as He taught his disciple after the request of the Sons of Zebedee; that the Way to Greatness in the Kingdom of God was through Service and Service of the Insignificant; *"Whoever wishes to be Great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be 1st among you will be the slave to all."* 

Self-giving, self-emptying in the simplicity of heart, like a child was the way, in the wisdom of the Kingdom of God.

We then witness Jesus uplift the insignificant; with-Bartimaeus, the blind man by the roadside. "Go your Faith has saved you." Bartimaeus received the Consolation of the Lord and became a disciple.

In today's Gospel, Jesus sitting opposite the treasury, in the temple, watched as the crowd put money into the temple's deposit box. He noticed the deposits of many rich people as they put in large sums of money and then the deposit of a poor widow; two small coins.

Her gesture of generosity compelled Jesus to call his Disciples and give them a lesson on generosity; "Amen I say to you, this poor Widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury."

This widow gave her life, quietly without publicity. Jesus, God among us, saw her Heart and praised her and revealed to humanity her interior motive; her generosity; "*They have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, she has contributed all she had to live on, her whole livelihood.*"

Pope Leo the Great commenting on this said; "On the scales of Divine Justice - meaning we've been given hence we are called to give back, the quantity of gifts is not weighed, but the quality of the Heart that is giving."

Amazingly, standing in the full view of every Disciple was the One who is all in all! Yet emptied himself, of the Glory of Heaven to give Life, ultimately and generously, for the Salvation of all.

Jesus teaches this to his disciples that he was on his way to Jerusalem. To the Altar of God's Generosity where as a grain of wheat he was about to die so that we could receive Life and Life in its Fullness.

We, the disciples of Christ are called to be generous!

### **CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH**

### III. The Gifts and Fruits of the Holy Spirit

**1830** The moral life of Christians is sustained by the gifts of the Holy Spirit. These are permanent dispositions which make man docile in following the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

**1831** The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit are wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. They belong in their fullness to Christ, Son of David.109 They complete and perfect the virtues of those who receive them. They make the faithful docile in readily obeying divine inspirations.

Let your good spirit lead me on a level path.110

For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God ... If children, then heirs, heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ.111.

**1832** The fruits of the Spirit are perfections that the Holy Spirit forms in us as the first fruits of eternal glory. the tradition of the Church lists twelve of them: "charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control, chastity."112

#### St. Leo the Great Nov 10th

Leo was born to Tuscan parents. His religious beliefs guided his entire life. As a deacon he worked to bring peace to warring Roman factions who were leaving Gaul vulnerable to barbarian invasion. Leo is well known for his peacekeeping efforts, and especially for his encounter with Attila the Hun, persuading Attila not to plunder Rome. During another attack three years later, Leo was not so successful, though he did manage to save the city from being burnt. Leo worked along-side the people to rebuild the city and its churches.

Pope from 440 until his death in 461, Leo is best known for his sermons on faith and charity. Always a strong opponent of heresies, his teaching has had a lasting influence on the life of the Roman Church. He is the first pope whose sermons and letters have been preserved in extensive collections. He was made Doctor of the Church in 1754. *Living with Christ, Nov 2024 edition*




