## SJXXIII Parish Bulletin | Solemnity of Christ the King | 23 November 2025



Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king." For this I was born, and for this I have come into the world, to bear witness to the truth. John 18:37

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, and the last Sunday of the Year of the Church. Next Sunday will be advent!

The Liturgical Year, is always, presented to us as a journey, which begins with the preparation of the coming of Christ in advent to his birth, then to the peak of our salvation in his passion, death and resurrection. We then celebrated the time of the Church, the time of the Spirit, which begins with the receiving of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

These last two Sundays, the readings have been reminding us about the "end of time." The Words from Prophet Malachi gave us the reason to endure in hope; "but for you who revere my name the Sun of righteous shall rise." This Son of righteousness is Christ Jesus, who today, we celebrate as "The King."

In the 1st Reading today, David is anointed King by the elders of Israel at Hebron. In their address to him, we notice what David meant to them; "You are the one who led Israel and brought it in," they exalted him. They quoted the Lord in definition of his kingship; "It is you who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you who shall be ruler over Israel;" David was to be the King with power!

When Angel Gabriel visited Mary at the Annunciation, these were his words; "Behold you are to conceive and bare a Son, ... He will be great and will be called Son of Most High. The Lord will give him the Throne of his father David ... and of his Kingdom there will be no end."

In the Gospel Reading today, Jesus, the fulfillment of all prophesies looks helpless and defeated in the eyes of many! In the eyes of John the Evangelist, however, it had been revealed that the Cross was "the Lifting up," the revealing sign; "When you have lifted up the Son of Man then you will know that I am He."

Jesus, earlier, had stood before Pilate who had questioned him; "So you are a King?" Jesus with a quiet dignity had explained his identity and Mission: "You say I am a King. For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the Truth." Jesus then challenged Pilate; "Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." Pilate, representative of earthly powers, was powerless; three times he walked in and out of the court chamber and declared; "I find no crime in him," but he has no courage to release him!

Jesus, the King, chose what an earthly King cannot! He foregoes the use of his power! To Peter he had said; do you think that I cannot appeal to my father, who would promptly send, more than twelve legions of Angels in my defense? He chose the image of "The suffering Servant of God," "A lamb led to slaughter" to manifest the Love he has for his subjects. He accepted to be the "grain of wheat that must die in order to produce." He suffered and died. Jesus, however, achieved victory beyond all comprehension. He rose from death. Through his obedience to The Father, unto the Cross, he reversed the disobedience of Adam and Eve. In the Act of God; He as the Priest and Perfect Victim of the Sacrifice, he won us back to God; Elevating us to being God's adopted Sons and Daughters. In Christ we share in his roles we are Priests, Prophets and more importantly as regards today, Kings.

When Pope Pius XI instituted this Feast in honor of Christ the King, he wanted to remind us, Christians, of the fidelity and loyalty we owed Christ; who made us future citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven. In this Eucharist, let us pray that through the Grace of God we may remain grateful and loyal subjects of the Kingdom of God, for the rest of our lives. †

#### CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

"FROM THENCE HE WILL COME AGAIN TO JUDGE THE LIVING AND THE DEAD"

### I. He Will Come Again in Glory

Christ already reigns through the Church

668 "Christ died and lived again, that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living." 548 Christ's Ascension into heaven signifies his participation, in his humanity, in God's power and authority. Jesus Christ is Lord: he possesses all power in heaven and on earth. He is "far above all rule and authority and power and dominion", for the Father "has put all things under his feet." 549 Christ is Lord of the cosmos and of history. In him human history and indeed all creation are "set forth" and transcendently fulfilled. 550

669 As Lord, Christ is also head of the Church, which is his Body.551 Taken up to heaven and glorified after he had thus fully accomplished his mission, Christ dwells on earth in his Church. the redemption is the source of the authority that Christ, by virtue of the Holy Spirit, exercises over the Church. "The kingdom of Christ (is) already present in mystery", "on earth, the seed and the beginning of the kingdom".552

670 Since the Ascension God's plan has entered into its fulfilment. We are already at "the last hour". 553 "Already the final age of the world is with us, and the renewal of the world is irrevocably under way; it is even now anticipated in a certain real way, for the Church on earth is endowed already with a sanctity that is real but imperfect."554 Christ's kingdom already manifests its presence through the miraculous signs that attend its proclamation by the Church. 555

... until all things are subjected to him.

671 Though already present in his Church, Christ's reign is nevertheless yet to be fulfilled "with power and great glory" by the King's return to earth. 556 This reign is still under attack by the evil powers, even though they have been defeated definitively by Christ's Passover. 557 Until everything is subject to him, "until there be realized new heavens and a new earth in which justice dwells, the pilgrim Church, in her sacraments and institutions, which belong to this present age, carries the mark of this world which will pass, and she herself takes her place among the creatures which groan and travail yet and await the revelation of the sons of God." That is why Christians pray, above all in the Eucharist, to hasten Christ's return by saying to him: 559 Maranatha! #### St. Andrew the Apostle Nov 30th

Andrew came from Bethsaida in Galilee. Like his father and his brother Simon, he was a fisherman. A disciple of John the Baptist, Andrew was present at Jesus' baptism. When John stated "Behold the Lamb of God." Andrew understood and followed Jesus Going to his brother Simon Peter, Andrew told him that he had found the Messiah. Thus, Andrew is known as the first disciple of Jesus. Later, when Jesus chose his apostles, Andrew was among the Twelve.

It is uncertain where Andrew preached or where he died, but ancient tradition associates him with Greece. Another tradition links him with Scotland, where his memory is said to have inspired the first bishop. The cross of Saint Andrew, which represents Scotland on the Union Jack, was first associated with Andrew in the 10th century. He is a patron saint of Scotland and Russia, of the Greek Church and of the fishing industry.

## About Christ the King

On the last Sunday of each liturgical year, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, or Christ the King.

Pope Pius XI instituted this feast in 1925 with his encyclical *Quas primas* ("In the first") to respond to growing secularism and atheism. He recognized that attempting to "thrust Jesus Christ and his holy law" out of public life would result in continuing discord among people and nations. This solemnity reminds us that while governments come and go, Christ reigns as King forever.

During the early twentieth century, in Mexico, Russia, and some parts of Europe, militantly secularistic regimes threatened not just the Catholic Church and its faithful but civilization itself. Pope Pius XI's encyclical gave Catholics hope and—while governments around them crumbled—the assurance that Christ the King shall reign forever. Jesus Christ "is very truth, and it is from him that truth must be obediently received by all mankind" (Quas primas, 7).

Christ's kingship is rooted in the Church's teaching on the Incarnation. Jesus is fully God and fully man. He is both the divine Lord and the man who suffered and died on the Cross. One person of the Trinity unites himself to human nature and reigns over all creation as the Incarnate Son of God. "From this it follows not only that Christ is to be adored by angels and men, but that to him as man angels and men are subject, and must recognize his empire; by reason of the hypostatic union Christ has power over all creatures" (Quas primas, 13).

The Church calls us to acknowledge Christ's kingship with our whole lives: He must reign in our minds, which should assent with perfect submission and firm belief to revealed truths and to the doctrines of Christ. He must reign in our wills, which should obey the laws and precepts of God. He must reign in our hearts, which should spurn natural desires and love God above all things, and cleave to him alone. He must reign in our bodies and in our members, which should serve as instruments for the interior sanctification of our souls, or to use the words of the Apostle Paul, 'as instruments of justice unto God.' -Quas primas, 33

## Funerals for Catholics have three distinct parts:[1]

#### The Funeral Mass

Christians celebrate the funeral rites to offer worship, praise, and thanksgiving to God for the gift of life which has now been returned to God, the author of life and the hope of the just. The Mass, the memorial of Christ's death and resurrection, is the principal celebration of the Christian funeral. (OCF # 5)

There is an emphasis on the baptism of the deceased since it is through baptism in Jesus that each person receives the promise of eternal life. The white pall draped over the casket, the holy water and the Easter candle are symbols of Christ's life which is bestowed through the waters of baptism.

#### The Rite of Committal

Prayers are offered to commit the body of the deceased to its final resting place. When the body has been or will be cremated, appropriate adaptions are made to the prayers of committal and signs of farewell.
