“Neither he nor his Parent sinned; he is blind so that the Works of God might be made visible through Him.” John 9:3

Today, we celebrate the 4th Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday) and the Entrance Antiphon of the Mass exalts us to rejoice!

“Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who loved her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning.”

The question one may have, could be; why rejoice?

We are to rejoice because the celebration the most “Important Act of the Lord,” for our Salvation is drawing near; His Passion, Death, and Resurrection. We are to rejoice, in the awareness, of what this Act of God achieved for humanity; through the Act we were reconciled to God, reestablishing anew the friendship we had in the Garden of Eden.

This journey toward Easter continues to be instructional; This last Sunday, liturgy urged us to retrace our journey since our Baptism. To encounter Jesus yet again, with the Samaritan Woman to whom, he revealed himself as the Source of the Living Water.

Today, we are at the Pool of Siloam, where Jesus reveals himself, through the healing of the Man born blind, that He is the Light of the World.

The 1st reading, today, leads the reflection; We are reminded of the anointing of David as the second King of Israel. It is fascinating to realize how blind we humans, sometimes, can be! Jesse, David’s father, is blinded by culture and appearances; To him, his son David is the youngest and the least likely to be anointed King by Samuel. He was, “the other that was tending sheep.” Human beings understand strength and power, God, on the other hand, is different; as Samuel tells us, ***“Not as Man sees does God see, ... the Lord looks into the heart!”***

In the Gospel today, the Disciples of Christ manifest the same kind of blindness; ***“Tell us Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his Parents, that he is blind?”*** How many times we thought, calamities in the world or in peoples’ life were a consequence of Sin?

Jesus responded to his disciples with clarification; ***“Neither he nor his Parent sinned; he is blind so that the Works of God might be made visible through Him.”***

The restoration of the physical sight happens quite fast. Jesus proclaims himself as the light of the world; He made clay, smeared it on the man and requested him to go and wash in the pool of Siloam “He went and washed and came back seeing.”

The story that follows, reveals the journey of faith of the Man born Blind; he had been, not only physically, but also spiritually blind.

The Man born blind grows gradually in Faith as Jesus is revealed to him. His Faith peaks when he professes his Faith in Jesus; ***“I do believe Lord.”*** In contrast to him, the Scribes and Pharisees, the religious of the day, sunk deeper and deeper into blindness. You hear Jesus challenge them; ***“If you were blind, you would have no guilt;”*** *Jesus told them, “But now, you say, we see, your guilt remains!”*

Last Sunday St Paul in his Letter to the Romans reminded of our privilege; ***“The Love of God has poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit given to you.”***

Today, in his Letter to the Ephesians, he exalts us; ***“We were once in darkness but now we are in the Light of the Lord!”***

May Jesus, the Light of the World, illumine our Way toward God, Our Father.



– Catechism of the Catholic Church–

Article 2 “AND IN JESUS CHRIST, HIS ONLY SON, OUR LORD”

I. JESUS [430] – Jesus means in Hebrew: “God saves.” At the annunciation, the angel Gabriel gave him the name Jesus as his proper name, which expresses both his identity and his mission. Since God alone can forgive sins, it is God who, in Jesus his eternal Son made man, “will save his people from their sins” in Jesus, God recapitulates all of his history of salvation on behalf of men.

[431] – In the history of salvation God was not content to deliver Israel “out of the house of bondage” by bringing them out of Egypt. He also saves them from their sin. Because sin is always an offence against God, only he can forgive it. For this reason Israel, becoming more and more aware of the universality of sin, will no longer be able to seek salvation except by invoking the name of the Redeemer God.

[432] – The name “Jesus” signifies that the very name of God is present in the person of his Son, made man for the universal and definitive redemption from sins. It is the divine name that alone brings salvation, and henceforth all can invoke his name, for Jesus united himself to all men through his Incarnation, so that “there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved.

[433] – The name of the Saviour God was invoked only once in the year by the high priest in atonement for the sins of Israel, after he had sprinkled the mercy seat in the Holy of Holies with the sacrificial blood, the mercy seat was the place of God’s presence. When St. Paul speaks of Jesus whom “God put forward as an expiation by his blood”, he means that in Christ’s humanity “God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself.”

[434] –Jesus’ Resurrection glorifies the name of the Saviour God, for from that time on it is the name of Jesus that fully manifests the supreme power of the “name which is above every name. The evil spirits fear his name; in his name his disciples perform miracles, for the Father grants all they ask

[435] – The name of Jesus is at the heart of Christian prayers. All liturgical prayers conclude with the words “through our Lord Jesus Christ”, the Hail Mary reaches its high point in the words “blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus: the Eastern prayer of the heart, the Jesus Prayer, says: “Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.” Many Christians, such as St. Joan of Arc, have died with the one word “Jesus” on their lips.


